But that's not all. There's a bonus project in this issue!

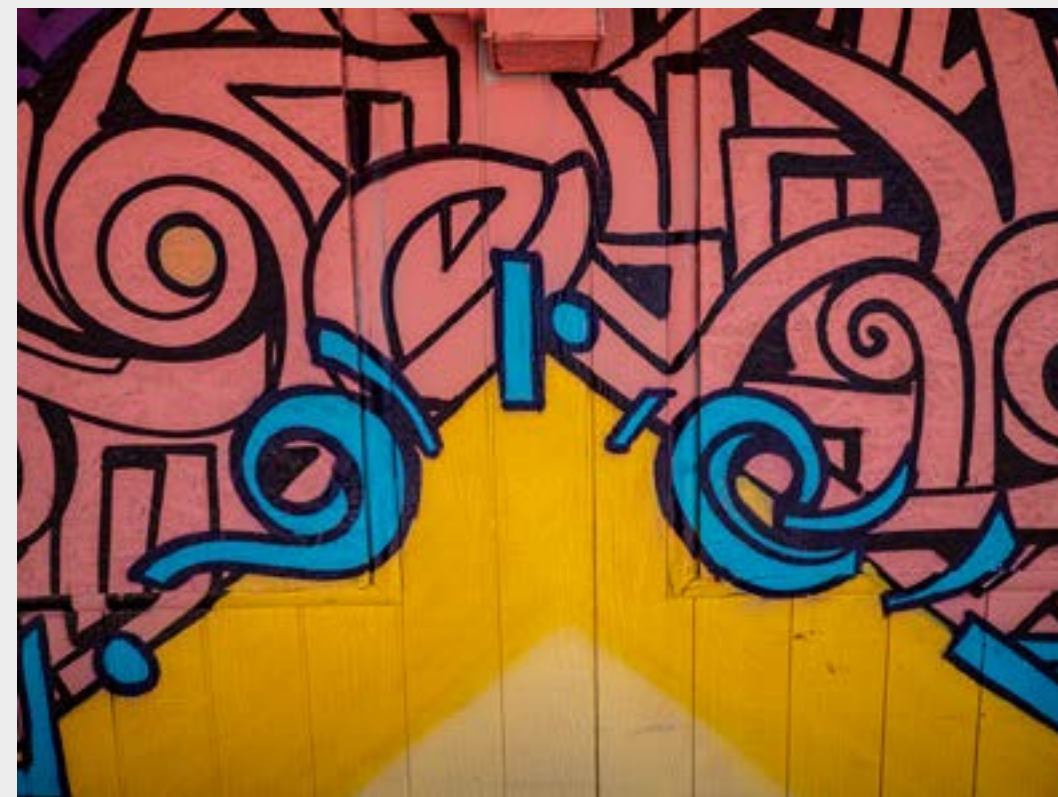

Sometimes I see a juried exhibit that piques my curiosity. One such exhibition intrigued me. Here is the invitation:

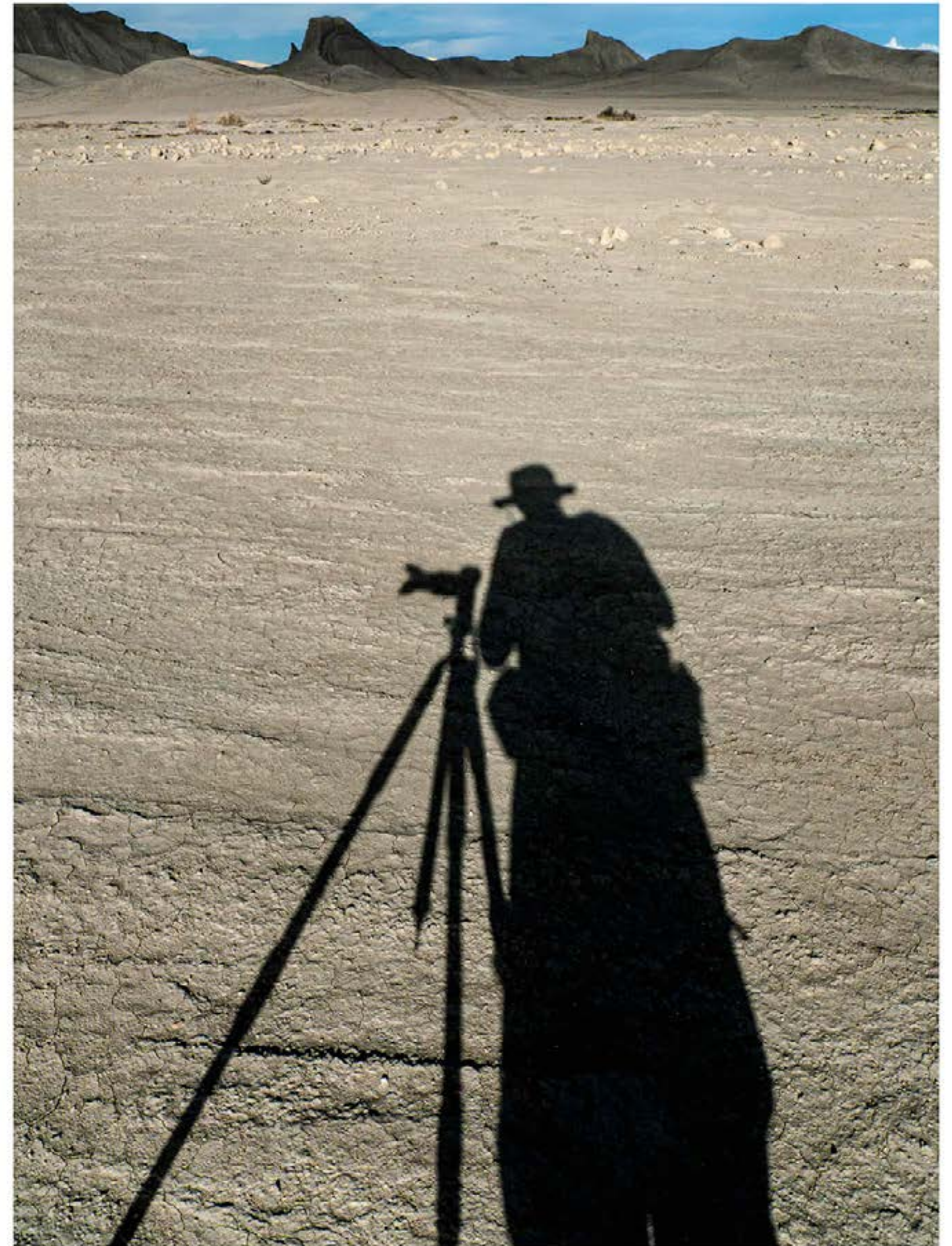
Revēlō (to show, uncover, reveal or disclose)

Well, that's what I had to work with. It was a bunch of fun to figure out how to do this my own way.

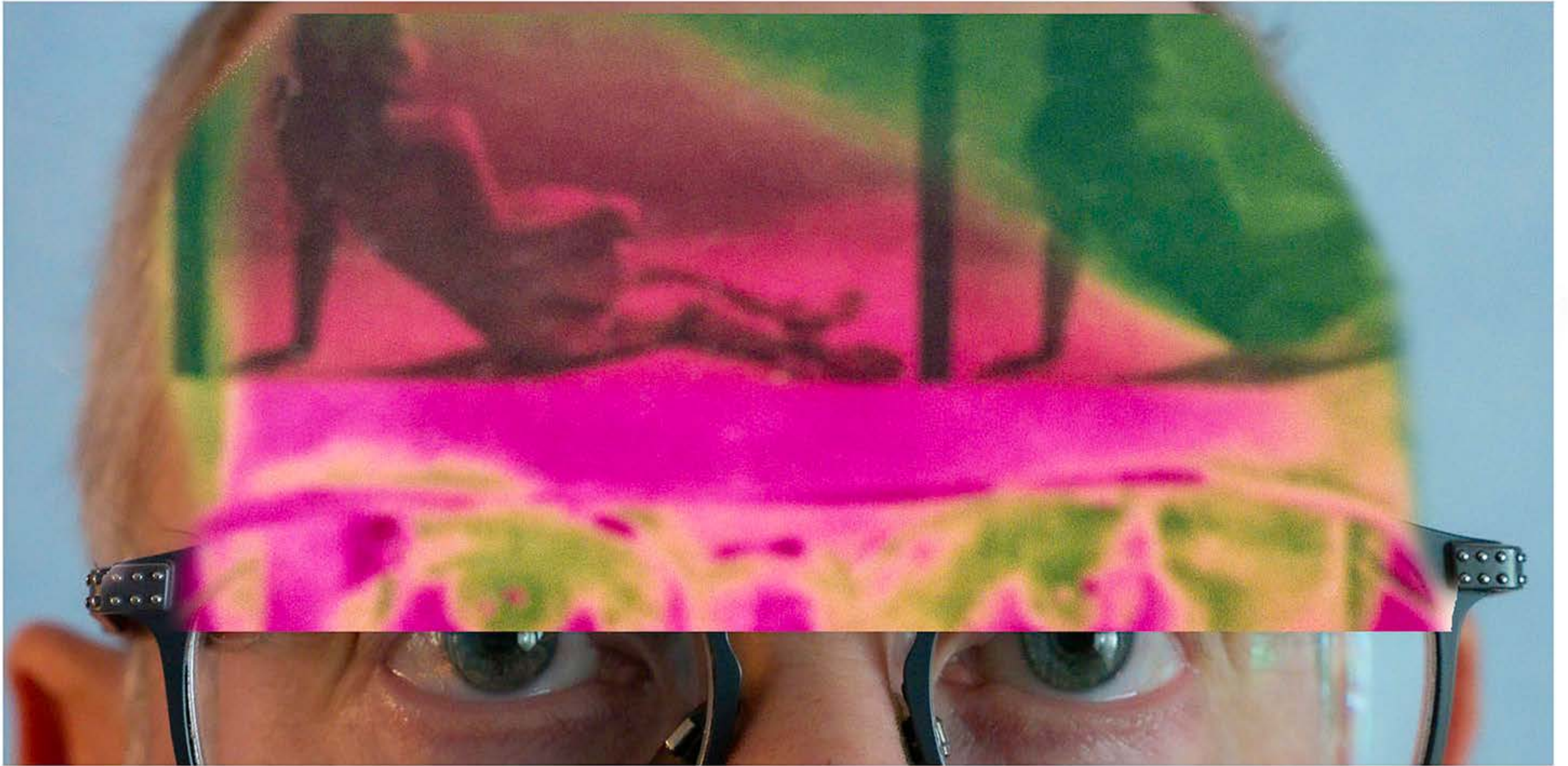
Sadly, the jurors saw fit to reject all my works. I might have a clue why these happy, not quite serious photographs were rejected, when I see what was accepted.

Do As I Say Because I Don't Do

When I was learning photography (so long ago I don't want to think about it) the instruction came from other photographers; people with a lot of experience in the creation of photographic prints from film negatives. They showed us their photographs, examples of their art created through technology. Their profession was making images and they shared their knowledge of photography.

Look at the current crop of photographic teachers. Pleasant people, very good at explaining the arcane functions of increasingly complex electronic contraptions and how software works. Have you seen anything other than "example photographs" in a book?

We have reached a point where photography is so sophisticated, we separate the instruction on camera operation, software and photography. We worry so much about hardware and software we have little time left for the aesthetics of photography.
