Spires


Spires

The rest of us must raise our eyes to see the greatness in front of them.




















Family vacations are really not the best place to make Fine Art Photographs, but sometimes you get lucky and it does happen. We were giving my brother a tour of the Pacific Northwest and we stopped at one of my favorite photographic haunts, Fort Stevens at the mouth of the Columbia River. People think all sorts of things about this photograph because of the symbolism of a child, the stairs, menacing concrete structures and the smallness of the child in a huge space all exaggerated by the extreme wide angle lens.

My daughter started to run down the stairs to begin her exploration of the fort. When I saw what was going to happen, I told her to stop because I needed to change to my 17 mm lens. Because I am a photographer, I moved her around a little bit to put here on the "right" stair, line her up with the shadows and extend her arms to touch each of the railings. A few frames later, she finished running down the stairs and began exploring the fort and generally having a good time.

Sometimes a photograph tells a story; sometimes a photograph lets the viewer make up their own story. Sometimes the two stories will agree.


Rolling Down the River
