



Such is one of life's unanswered questions. We have many more questions in life that go without answers, but at the moment, we just want to know if anyone wants to see us.
























A Mostly True Story


She passed away when she was 94. We still have a candle in the window.

Wide Open Quiet





Wide Open Quiet


