


WELCOME TO THE LIPKA JOURNAL GEPTEMBER 2025

























A Mostly True Story

Until that is, a critical mass of these little moments, mostly forgotten, return to remind you of the great journeys, people and places from your life.



































Postcards from the Creative Journey





Work Space


